

Sound beam technology started with an accidental discovery by an American inventor, Edward Norris. In 1956, he was experimenting with ultrasonic waves, which are far above the range of human hearing. He noticed that two slightly different ultrasonic waves create another ultrasonic wave, which in turn produces an audible sound.

After doing further experiments, Norris then discovered that the ultrasonic waves can be transmitted in the form of a laser-like sound beam. However, this unique transmission ability does not exist with low-pitched audible sound waves, which spread out like a fan across a room.

Because the laser-like beams do not spread out, only people in a small target area can hear the sound. Museum visitors, for example, would hear exhibit explanations only as they step into the sound cone near the display.







WRITING PROCESS

Note-taking

We can see numerous cases in which two species live in close association for an extended time in nature. This partnership, which is called *symbiosis*, is often categorized into three types.

The first type is *mutualism*, in which both organisms benefit from the relationship. More often than not, this kind of association is rather obligatory. In other words, both species will have difficulty surviving if they are separated.

In the second type *commensalism*, one member benefits whereas the other is not affected by the association. They may share food, space, shelter or transport, but one member will not die even if it gets out of the association.

The last type, *parasitism* is the relationship in which one organism benefits and the other is harmed. In most cases, this kind of co-existence lasts for the lifetime of one party.

The most important property of stem cells is that they can grow into nearly any cell type and thus may replace cells lost to disease or injury. According to scientists, stem cells could become a revolutionary treatment for cancer, diabetes, Parkinson's and hundreds of other illnesses.

Next, stem cells have the advantage of being easy to obtain for medical purposes. They can be extracted from embryos before the embryo's cells come to have specialized functions. Each embryo has nearly 100 stem cells, a number which doubles every 2 to 3 days. The cells can then be kept alive forever in stem cell banks.

Finally, using stem cells in clinics could someday save billions of dollars in drug costs. Treatment of disease would be less dependent on the pharmaceutical industry and would be controlled more by the doctors themselves.

Sound beam technology started with an accidental discovery by an American inventor, Elwood Norris. In 1996, he was experimenting with ultrasonic waves, which are far above the range of human hearing. He noticed that two slightly different ultrasonic waves create another ultrasonic wave, which in turn produces an audible sound.

After doing further experiments, Norris then discovered that the ultrasonic waves can be transmitted in the form of a laser-like sound beam. However, this unique transmission ability does not exist with low-pitched audible sound waves, which spread out like a fan across a room.

Because the laser-like beams do not spread out, only people in a small target area can hear the sound. Museum visitors, for example, would hear exhibit explanations only as they step into the sound zone near the display.

Child labor, or the employment of children younger than a country's legal minimum working age, is a severe problem all over the world. You may ask, then, what kinds of workplaces these underage workers are employed in.

About 70% of the world's child laborers work in the agricultural sector of the economy. In many parts of the developing world, children work as helpers on their own family's farms or as laborers on commercial farms. A study, for instance, estimated that about 30% of Ethiopia's state-owned farms employ child workers.

Children are also employed in factories, where they do difficult and repetitive work such as sewing and dyeing clothing. In Bangladesh, thousands of the country's estimated 2 million textile workers are children younger than 14.

Finally, children often work in tourist areas as waiters, guides or vendors. In some tourist areas of India, such as New Delhi and Agra, they may also work as assistants for taxi drivers and shop owners.

Antibiotics are strong medicines that kill disease-causing bacteria. In many cases, however, these “wonder drugs” have stopped working. Why has this occurred?

First, we are affected by the antibiotics in the food we eat. Animal feed and plant soil both contain antibiotics, so we receive tiny antibiotic doses whenever we eat meat or vegetables. As a result of this, our body’s bacteria gradually become used to fighting the drugs, so medicines will become less effective.

In addition, our own medical overuse of antibiotics has created powerful antibiotic-resistant “supergerms”. Treatment of acne with Tetracycline has, for example, created a staph bacterial supergerm that cannot be killed by antibiotics.

Finally, many people using antibiotics experience unhealthy side effects because they ignore their doctors’ instructions. Antibiotics, being powerful poisons, also kill the “good” bacteria in our stomach, so any improper use of them can cause serious problems such as stomach upsets, skin problems and even kidney failure.

Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) is a common childhood behavior disorder characterized by poor concentration, overactive behavior and impulsive actions. Many experts now believe that low levels of dopamine, a brain chemical associated with self-control, may cause the following symptoms.

One symptom of ADHD is inattentive behavior. Schoolchildren with ADHD may appear to be bored or daydreaming in class, and they often struggle to follow teachers' instructions. They may also lose or forget important items such as book-bags.

Another sign of ADHD is hyperactive behavior, where children may seem "always on the go" and act "as if driven by a motor". Children with ADHD may find it hard to sit still in class. Those restless children may get up at inappropriate times or interrupt their teachers.

Children with ADHD also exhibit impulsive behavior, in which they seem "out of control". This behavior can include reckless actions such as climbing on the roofs or setting fires. Because of these symptoms, children with ADHD often have academic or disciplinary problems in school.



The most common technique for protection is to match the background of one's surroundings. Some animals change their colors in accordance with a change in the environment. These creatures have a collection of chromatophores, each of which contains a single pigment. They alter their overall skin color by manipulating those chromatophores if it is necessary.





The subject and verb in a sentence must agree in number. That is, if a subject is singular, it requires a singular verb and if plural, it requires a plural verb.

Rule 1 Indefinite pronouns such as *each, either, neither, anyone, anybody, anything, someone, somebody, something, everyone, etc.* take singular verbs.

ex Each of the girls **takes** her turn at bungee jumping.

Rule 2 Indefinite pronouns such as *all* and *some* can be singular or plural depending on what they are referring to.

ex Some of the coins **are** missing from her purse.
Some of the bread **tastes** stale.

Rule 3 Nouns such as *mathematics, news* and *measles* take singular verbs.

ex **Mathematics** **is** my favorite subject.

Rule 4 Collective nouns such as *class, family* and *committee* take singular verbs when regarded as a unit. But they take plural verbs when the individuals in the group are regarded separately.

Question 1 of 2

Free Internet file sharing networks, which enable downloading of music and other entertaining things, have been proven to be a great way of getting entertainment. Thanks to these applications, millions of people can explore new music and share their favorite songs.

File sharing networks can stimulate CD sales by giving musicians, especially lesser known musicians, exposure to millions of Internet users. Music consumers are allowed a chance to "try out" any new songs online, and this often leads them to buy CDs. For years, the song sharing service Napster has been praised for its ability to promote a band's new material.

Use of file sharing networks has, in fact, been judged legal on the basis of an earlier Supreme Court case. Lately two U.S. high courts used the Supreme Court's "Betamax" decision, which ruled that videotaping TV shows was legal, to determine that file sharers are using Internet technology lawfully in the same way as the older generation of videotape users.

Finally, today's free music sharing sites are generally safe to use. Many are scanned and tested on a daily basis to receive "Hacker Safe" certification. They also have virus filters that block possibly damaging files.

Question 1: Summarize the points made in the lecture you just heard, explaining how they cast doubt on the points made in the reading.

Score 5

The lecture argues that free file sharing networks can cause a lot of harm, casting doubt on the reading's claim that they are an excellent means of finding entertainment.

First, the professor says the networks cost musicians millions of dollars in lost CD sales. She cited the band Radiohead that came out against online networks for airing their CD prior to its retail debut. This runs against the reading's claim that the networks can stimulate CD sales by allowing music consumers a chance to try out any new songs online.

In addition, the professor says file sharing is not legal in case downloaded material is copyrighted, adding that the U.S. Supreme Court ruled against file swappers for sharing copyrighted songs. This refutes the reading's claim that use of file sharing networks has been judged legal based on an earlier Supreme Court case.

Lastly, the professor mentions that music file sharing can be dangerous as hackers and cyber criminals can uncover who you are by monitoring song requests. This questions the reading's claim that free music sharing sites are free of risk as they are scanned and tested daily and equipped with virus filters.

Score 4

The lecture says free file sharing networks can cause a lot of harms, while the reading says they are a great way for getting entertainment.

The professor first mentions that the networks take away millions of dollars in music sales. She mentions a case of the band Radiohead complaining about the networks playing its CD too soon. On the other hand, the reading says file sharing can promote CDs and help sales.

Buying is an inseparable part of our lives, and we sometimes happen to get goods or services that are not satisfactory. In those cases, some people complain in person, but I would rather write an email for the following reasons.

First of all, writing a complaint letter is convenient. Once I bought an MP3 player from a mall downtown, but it abruptly stopped working only after two days. Instead of taking it to the mall myself, I sent an email to the customer center, explaining the situation. After a week, a clerk came to my house with a new MP3 player and took the broken one back. He noticed that when two loud notes are played on an organ, a third note is also produced. This is the basic principle of Norris' unique sound beam system.

Sound beam technology works because ultrasonic waves travel farther and carry the original sound better through the air. But low-pitched sound waves spread out and weaken quickly in the air.

As the sound beams are aimed like a light laser, only a person in the exact target zone hears the sound. It's like the person "becomes" a radio receiver. Using the technology, a grocery store might play an audio advertisement that allows only the shopper in front of certain goods to hear it.

In addition, factories that manufacture textiles and sporting goods also employ child workers because

their fingers are small and skillful enough for hard, precise tasks like sewing. In the recent past, the media has reported on children as young as 12 years old sewing together soccer balls and T-shirts in Pakistani factories.

Finally, in many tourist areas, children often help bring customers to their families' restaurants or souvenir shops because they seem more approachable than adults. These young "touts" are especially common in India, where they also help draw in business for taxi drivers.

Animals are senselessly killed and left to die on the side of the road, and the number is increasing. It's a serious problem for wildlife, particularly for endangered species. Today, we'll discuss some ways to solve the roadkill problem.

First, wildlife ecology should be taken into consideration before constructing new roads. In Australia, road construction projects are meticulously examined to see if they would affect wildlife habitats and populations. In this way, people can minimize the impact of road construction on native fauna.

Another measure is building more well-located ecobridges, a passage that enables wild animals to move around for feeding, nesting or resting. Constructing guide fences is also helpful for less used wildlife passages as the fences lead animals toward ecobridges for their safety.

Third, drivers should be more careful around the roads that nocturnal animals frequent. When they see traffic signs that indicate areas of increased animal

activity, drivers should slow down and watch for potential accidents.

For today's class, I'm going to discuss some ways to prevent the problems caused by antibiotics. The ultimate goal is to have antibiotics in our body only when it is necessary.

To start with, we can avoid getting antibiotics from food by consuming organic meat or vegetables. We can check the labels on the package when we shop for food or grow some vegetables like lettuce at home.

Besides that, we can also avoid medical overuse of antibiotics by getting more specific tests when we get sick. In case of a sore throat, a simple test can tell us whether it's just a virus. If it is a viral infection, then no antibiotics are needed.

Most importantly, we have to educate people about how much harm antibiotics can cause us when they are misused. Patients should be advised that

antibiotics will cause dangerous medical problems if they are not taken according to doctors' exact directions.

Today we are going to continue our discussion of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, or ADHD. We know about its symptoms, but what about its treatment?

One part of most ADHD treatment programs is prescription medication. The drug Ritalin, for example, raises the brain's dopamine levels and, as a result, can make children more focused in handling the demands of school. According to studies, about 70% of children with ADHD do better in school after being given Ritalin.

Teachers can also help children with ADHD who still display symptoms of being constantly active and restless. These children can be allowed to work off their excess energy by becoming a "teacher's assistant", running small errands or passing out papers to the class.

Finally, impulsive behavior symptoms of ADHD can be treated effectively with behavior therapy. Behavior therapy is simply a system of rewarding quiet, productive behavior and punishing reckless actions. As an example, a child who behaves well can be complimented with reward stickers.

Good morning, class. You've all read about the potential nutrition and environmental benefits associated with genetically modified – GM, for short – foods. Well, today I'm going to talk about some of the harmful effects of GM foods.

To start with, GM foods, often nicknamed "Frankenfoods", could put humans at risk for deadly food aller-

gies. For example, Brazil nut genes, which can cause fatal allergic reactions in some people, were discovered in one U.S. company's genetically modified soybeans. Fortunately, the product was quickly withdrawn from the market.

In addition, growing GM foods may harm the environment by killing helpful insects. In one study, Cornell University researchers found that Monarch butterflies died after eating leaves containing BT bacteria, a natural insect poison inserted into GM crops.

Finally, GM foods could give a few huge agribusiness companies a dangerous monopoly on global food production. In 2006, the top three seed companies – Monsanto, Dupont, and Syngenta – controlled 44% of the global market. All of these companies are active in GM technology, and in the future their policies could affect the world's food supply.

Some animals run for their lives when they see danger. But other species just stand still where they are, adapting certain appearances that make themselves harder targets for their predators. Today, we'll discuss different adaptations that protect some animals against their enemies.

The most frequently used tactic for protection is "blending in" or background-matching coloration. You can often see this kind of disguise in nature. For example, cuttlefish perceive the color of a backdrop and alter the color and pattern on their skin accordingly. By choosing the right combination of chromatophores, cuttlefish match themselves with all sorts of surroundings.

The second is "blurring" or disruptive markings. Some animals have spots, stripes or patches that serve to confuse their predators. A herd of zebras, for instance, looks like a big, striped mass to a lion. Their vertical black and white lines appear to run together, making it hard for a predator to select and attack on a specific zebra.

The last one is "copycatting" or faking other dangerous species. In general, weaker species like insects

turn to this aggressive tactic. Let's look at the back of a hawk moth caterpillar. It actually looks like the head of a snake, which can frighten away most predators that they might come across.

Well, most of you have probably used or at least heard of the many popular free file sharing networks on the Internet. Enjoying these sites may seem safe and fun, but you should be aware that they can cause a lot of harm.

File sharing networks have cost musicians millions of dollars in lost CD sales because new music is often shared online before it even appears in stores. In 2003, the band Radiohead criticized online file sharing networks for playing their CD *Hail to the Thief* months before its official release.

On top of that, file sharing is not legal in case the downloaded material is copyrighted. In more detail, the U.S. Supreme Court recently determined that its own "Betamax" decision did not apply to file swappers who share copyrighted songs without permission. So, you are breaking the law when you "unofficially" share just one copyrighted song.

Finally, sharing music files presents risks to computer users. Hackers and cyber criminals can find out users' identities by monitoring song requests sent over file sharing networks. Moreover, fatal viruses like the Trojan horse can enter your computer through fake music files.
